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
GREETINGS FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

2024 has been an exceptionally busy year, thus far, for Rapho Township. We moved back to our permanent office building at 971 N. Colebrook Road, after having spent over six months at the Mastersonville Fire Department in a temporary office. We thank them for their quick response and generous offer of office space and will forever be thankful for their actions. We solicited proposals and hired a new auditor and then completed our 2023 annual audit. This Spring we rebid a new municipal trash contract. See the related story on page 5. Additionally, we designed and bid our new public works building. A rendering of the new building is shown below. NCI Construction, LTD was awarded the contract for the structure and Leo Kob Co, Inc was awarded the contract for plumbing, electrical and HVAC. We also procured additional real estate for an expanded woody yard waste recycling facility. Our public works crew has a full slate of projects they are doing this year in addition to site work and stormwater for our municipal campus projects.

We are still utilizing the Mount Joy Boro/East Donegal Township Compost Site and our Public Works Department is still utilizing rented space from Mount Joy Township. Again, we thank each of these municipalities, as well as others who have lent us equipment, facilities, and labor while we work to complete the rebuilding of the Rapho Township Public Works site. Our hope is that all work is completed on the Public Works building by the end of 2024, and that our Yard Waste Recycling Facility is re-opened in early 2025.

We also thank you, the residents of Rapho Township, for your patience as we work through this difficult period, post the events of July 5, 2023. As I stated in the Fall 2023 Rapho Reporter, "We will rebuild, we will return to, and we will reopen at 971 N Colebrook Road." We are partially there, and as the saying goes..." All good things take time." When all is completed, the Rapho Township facility will be bigger and better than before to meet the needs of our residents more efficiently.

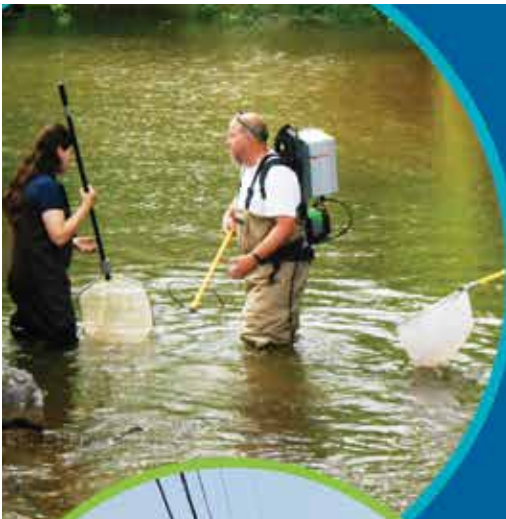

TRASH TALKIN'

On July 1, 2024, we will begin a new trash and recycling contract with Penn Waste. We were anticipating a price increase with a new contract, and the great news is that our yearly price will stay the same! Three companies bid on the trash contract, and Penn Waste, once again, submitted the lowest bid. There will be no changes to our new contract, and we have signed a five-year contract. As a customer, you will continue to be provided with a 96-gallon trash cart and a 64-gallon recycle cart. Customers are reminded that the carts are the property of the trash hauler and may not be altered in any fashion by the customer.



The quarterly fee will be \$75, making the yearly fee \$300. A \$10.00 discount will be offered to those customers making one yearly payment of \$290 that must be received in the Lock Box by 6/30/2024 and not postmarked by that date.

Customers are reminded that the Lock Box can only process trash payments. Please do not send key fob payments, tax payments, building permit payments, etc. to the Lock Box.

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WE'VE MOVED...OUR YARD WASTE RECYCLING FACILITY

Mount Joy Borough and East Donegal Township share a yard waste facility and were kind enough to allow Rapho Township residents to use their facility in the wake of the explosion on July 5th. Fortunately, their security and entry system are identical to our "former" system and thus it was a smooth transition for our residents. With the swift assistance of 3T Security and our office staff spending several days transferring credentials into their system, we were up and running one week after the explosion.

If you renewed your key fob for 2024, it will be active at their facility. If you did not renew it, please stop into the Rapho Township Office to pay for the renewal. The cost is \$15. You may also mail a check to us for the renewal, and checks should be mailed to 971 North Colebrook Road, Manheim.

The hours of operation are the same – dawn to dusk, each day. The rules and usage are the same – NO grass clippings, NO tree stumps, and branches NO longer than 8 feet and NO larger than 18 inches in diameter (a slight difference from our policy). Yard waste is not required to be bagged, but if that is your preference, please use the biodegradable Kraft Bags. They can be purchased at any hardware, grocery, or big box store.

MOUNT JOY BORO/EAST DONEGAL TOWNSHIP FACILITY REGULATIONS:

- The site accepts yard waste materials (sticks, branches, etc.).
- The following items will **not** be accepted: grass clippings, tree branches/trunks over 19" in diameter and/or over 8' in length, tree stumps, construction/demolition waste (boards, etc.).
- Yard waste is not required to be bagged, but if you prefer to do so, Kraft Bags can be purchased at the Borough Office at 21 East Main Street, Mount Joy, or at the Milanof-Schock Library, 1184 Anderson Ferry Road, Mount Joy.

Directions
From East Main St., turn onto S. Barbara St., make a left onto E. Donegal St., then a right onto S. Jacob St. Follow S. Jacob St. until you can go no further. Arrive at the Compost Facility.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF ZONING IN PENNSYLVANIA

Zoning is, at its core, the municipal regulation of the use of land. Today, a municipality regulates the use of land by implementing a zoning ordinance. However, as far back as the 18th century, land use regulations were enacted in Pennsylvania. Early land use regulations in Pennsylvania and elsewhere were generally concerned with preventing the spread of fires. For example, an act was adopted in the 1700s that prohibited baking and barrel making except in shops or places of masonry. After the Revolutionary War, a law was adopted that prohibited storing more than 30 pounds of gunpowder within two miles of Philadelphia. The concept of setback (i.e., the required distance between a structure and a property line) was implemented to provide for adequate distances between buildings to prevent the spread of fires.



Lower Merion Township was the first municipality in Pennsylvania to adopt a zoning ordinance. However, the ordinance was subsequently challenged, and the Superior Court found in 1925 that the Township did not have the authority to adopt the ordinance. In the Euclid case decided the following year, the United States Supreme Court held that zoning is a constitutional exercise of the police power.

The police power is a concept that is central to zoning. It is an inherent power of the state to protect and promote the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare. Most zoning laws, however, are enacted at the municipal level rather than the state level. Accordingly, states delegate the authority to regulate the use of land – a police power – to municipalities through zoning enabling acts since municipalities only have the powers granted to them by the state. In Pennsylvania, the enabling statute that gives municipalities the authority to regulate the use of land is the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC). The MPC was enacted in 1968 and authorizes municipalities across Pennsylvania to adopt zoning ordinances for the purposes set forth in the MPC. However, not all municipalities in Pennsylvania have adopted a zoning ordinance.

Pennsylvania has 67 counties and 2,561 municipalities. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED), as of 2015 approximately 68% of all municipalities in Pennsylvania had zoning regulations. Of the 1,739 municipalities with zoning, 137 of those municipalities had not adopted their own zoning ordinance and were under a county zoning ordinance. That left 822 municipalities without any zoning regulations. Municipalities without zoning tend to be more rural, less developed, and less populated than municipalities with zoning. DCED found that as of 2015, 98.2% of Pennsylvania's urban population was zoned while only 68.9% of the rural population was zoned.

Although the number of municipalities in Pennsylvania that have adopted zoning ordinances in the fifty years since the enactment of the MPC is somewhat surprising, there is no expectation that the municipal regulation of land will decrease. Rather, it is expected that the municipal regulation of the use of land will only continue to increase and become more extensive.

2024 PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS

Rapho Township Public Works Department has the following road improvement projects scheduled for 2024:

Resurfacing of Habecker Road from Kinderhook Road to Iron Bridge Road; Resurfacing of Loop Road and Rock Circle; Resurfacing of Drager Road; Widening of Garfield Road.

The Playground surface at the Rapho Community Park was replaced with funding from a grant from the Local Share State-wide Program.

In addition, Rapho Township, with a Penn DOT Green Light Go Grant, will be upgrading the following traffic signals: Traffic Signal Radar will be installed at Strickler Road and PA 772; Elmcrest Blvd and PA 772; Elmcrest Blvd and PA 230. Additionally, the Traffic Signal at Esbenshade Road and PA 772 will get both signal radar and preemption.

All the soap, scum, and oily grit runs along the curb. Then into the storm drain and directly into our streams, rivers and the Chesapeake Bay. And that causes pollution which is unhealthy for fish. So how do you avoid this whole mess? Easy. Wash your car on grass or gravel instead of the street. Or better yet, take it to a car wash where the water gets treated and recycled.

IT'S GRILLING SEASON

Springtime and warmer weather bring thoughts of cooking outside, and there is nothing better than a picnic supper cooked on an outdoor grill. However, a grill placed too close to the house, the deck rails or any object that can burn, quickly becomes a fire hazard. And obviously can cause serious burn injuries to humans and pets. Follow the safety tips below to ensure safe and enjoyable outdoor cooking.

Safety Tips:

- Always open the grill lid before lighting the grill.
- All BBQ grills – propane, natural gas, and charcoal – should only be used outdoors.
- Grills should be placed far away from the house, deck rails, as well as from under the eaves of the house and low hanging branches.
- Children and pets should not be within three feet of the grill area.
- Clean your grill of grease or fat, often, as well as the catch pan below the grill.
- Never leave the grill unattended.

Charcoal Grill Use:

- Use only charcoal starter fluid, and never add it or any other flammable liquid to the fire.
- Keep charcoal starter fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- When you are finished grilling, allow the coals to completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Propane Grills:

- At the beginning of each grilling season, check the gas tank hose for leaks by applying a light soap and water solution to the hose. If there is a leak, bubbles will be visible. If your gas grill has a leak either by the bubble test or smell, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call 911.
- If you smell gas while grilling, immediately get away from the grill and call 911. Do not move the grill.

Outdoor Grilling Facts:

- July is the peak month for grilling injuries.
- Approximately half of grilling injuries are thermal burns.



SPRING ENERGY SAVING TIPS FROM PPL

- **Thermostat Settings** – Use programmable settings and match outdoor temperatures.
- **Natural Light** – Take advantage of longer days of natural light.
- **HVAC Systems** – Schedule yearly HVAC service and maintenance for optimal efficiency.
- **Window Blinds** – Keep blinds closed or slats tilted upward toward the ceiling to block heat from the sun. This can reduce heat gain by up to 45 percent.
- **Ceiling Fans** – Set your blades to spin counterclockwise during summer months.

BE WISE WHEN YOU FERTILIZE



Pennsylvania Urban Nutrient Management – Be Green While Protecting Our Streams Protecting Pennsylvania’s Waterways Starts at Home.

Turfgrass has become a major component of Pennsylvania’s flora. In fact, according to DCNR, Pennsylvania now contains over 2 million acres of lawn. Selecting a proper turfgrass management program, whether it is on a private lawn, sports field, public park, or golf course, is essential to protecting our local waterways.

Know What Your Lawn Needs

When looking to apply nutrients to your lawn, make sure you are aware of what your lawn needs and what the Pennsylvania Fertilizer Law allows. To determine your lawn’s nutrient needs, it is best to first soil test. Soil tests provide specific recommendations for nitrogen, phosphate, and potassium. Following the soil test recommendations ensures that you are applying only what your lawn needs, thus reducing nutrient loss and fertilizer cost. Test kits can be purchased for a nominal fee from your local Penn State extension office.

The Pennsylvania Fertilizer Law

In July 2022, Pennsylvania adopted a new fertilizer law designed to minimize the movement of nutrients into our waterways. Anyone who applies fertilizers should be aware of the following nutrient limitations.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen per 1000 ft² per application.
- No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
- Both the nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced efficiency fertilizer.
 - Enhanced efficiency fertilizers are specifically designed to reduce nutrient losses to the environment while increasing availability to plants.

In addition, when applying fertilizer, applicators must follow specific environmental conditions to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams.

- Do not apply if a heavy rain is expected.
- Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water.
- Maintain a 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.
- Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (i.e. driveways, sidewalks, roads) back onto the application area.
- Do not use as a snow or ice melt.
- Do not spread fertilizer on snow-covered or frozen ground.
- Fertilizer application between December 15 and March 1 is restricted to 0.50 lbs of total nitrogen per 1000 ft² per application.

Read the Label

Manufacturers of fertilizer products must include detailed labels that provide the nutrient content and instructions for use. As a fertilizer applicator, you are strongly encouraged to read and follow all directions and apply your fertilizer using a properly calibrated spreader.

Lawn Care Considerations

Nutrient management is not the only tool that can be used for limiting nutrient loss. There are many additional lawn care considerations that can be used to promote a healthy lawn while protecting our local waterways. A few examples are listed below.

Fertilizer may not be the solution. If your lawn is not looking as healthy and green as you would like, sometimes fertilizer is not the answer. Applying fertilizer without understanding the underlying soil can result in a waste of money and nutrients. There are many soil health factors that play a critical role in maintaining your lawn. Reducing soil compaction can improve root growth and water infiltration. Maintaining an appropriate soil pH is essential to promoting proper nutrient availability. Soil texture and organic matter content influence water movement, nutrient availability, and the microbial ecosystem of the soil. A healthy soil supports a healthy lawn.

Raise your mower deck. Set your mower deck to 3 inches or higher. A taller lawn provides shade that discourages weed growth and promotes strong root development helping lawns to withstand environmental stress. Alternatively, you can use low mow turf species, such as fine fescue blends, that do best when mowing is limited. A taller, healthier lawn slows water movement and increases infiltration keeping moisture, soil, and nutrients where they are needed most.

Mulch your grass clippings. Keeping your clippings in place returns valuable organic matter and nutrients to your lawn.

Provide a buffer. Do not mow up to the banks of streams. Maintaining vegetative buffers along waterways provides wildlife habitat while slowing and filtering water before it enters the stream.

Convert your lawn. Replacing turf with native vegetation not only increases water infiltration, but also promotes biodiversity and creates habitats for pollinators and other wildlife. For more information on Lawn Conversion visit DCNR's website.

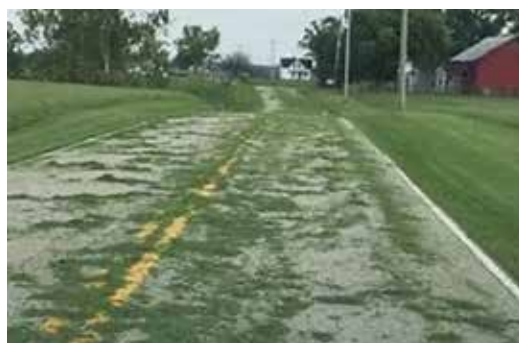

PLEASE DON'T THROW GRASS CLIPPINGS INTO THE STREET!

When mowing your lawn please do not blow grass clippings into the street. They should be blown back into your yard. If they are blown into the street, they will end up in storm drains and could possibly clog the drains during heavy rain events. This could ultimately cause flooding. Equally important is that they are a hazard to motorcycle and bicycle riders.



WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH MY GRASS CLIPPINGS?

It is mowing season, once again, and as you prepare for it, please consider the following points concerning lawn maintenance:

- Bagging your grass clippings is more harmful for your lawn. It robs your lawn of valuable nutrients.
- Grass clippings are 20 – 30 % protein, contain about 4% nitrogen, 2% potassium, and .5% phosphorous plus trace elements that plants need.
- Grass clippings are not accepted at the Mount Joy Borough/East Donegal Township Compost Site and additionally are not accepted curbside by any of the trash haulers.
- "Grasscycling" is a simple alternative to bagging your grass clippings.

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) offers the following tips for "grasscycling":

- Grass clippings left on your lawn will break down in 7 to 14 days and act as a top-dressing fertilizer, helping to keep your lawn green and healthy.
- Mow often, cutting less than 1/3 of the grass growth.
- Mow when your grass is dry and keep your mower blades sharp.
- Don't allow large clumps of grass to accumulate on your lawn.
- Don't use harsh chemicals and fertilizers.
- Water your lawn less frequently, but for longer periods of time.
- If possible, use a mulching mower that grinds the clippings.

Ways to Keep Cooling Costs Low this Summer

- **Install a programmable thermostat.** Consider adjusting your thermostat upward during nighttime hours and when you're not home. This will help keep your energy bill low during the hot summer months.
- **Only use ceiling fans when you're under them.** Ceiling fans are more efficient than air conditioners, but leaving them on all the time won't do you much good. A ceiling fan merely circulates air, it will not actually lower the temperature.
- **Install air conditioners in the warmest rooms.** To keep it cool, you may be tempted to turn your thermostat down into the arctic range. The rest of the house will be freezing, but that room will finally be comfortable. This wastes money by making your central air-conditioning system work overtime.
- **Keep it clean.** Cleaning the air-conditioner filters, whether you have window units or a central unit – is just as important as replacing your furnace filter regularly in the winter. When the filter gets dirty, the unit has to work extra hard to pull air into the system, which costs more energy.
- **Hang out the laundry.** Your dryer is probably one of your homes biggest energy users. It takes a lot of electricity (or gas) to generate heat that dries your clothes. Plus, some of that heat escapes the dryer and winds up heating your home unnecessarily. Let the hot sun work for you instead of against you this summer by hanging your clothes to dry outside on a clothesline. The sun is great for bleaching stains out of white clothes and towels, too!
- **Close curtains, blinds and shades.** Thick draperies, window shades and solar screens all help keep heat out of your house during the day, meaning your AC unit won't have to work at max capacity to cool your home. Whatever your treatments, you'll see significant savings if you work to prevent solar heat gain by keeping them drawn all day.



Lightning Safety

Thunder and lightning storms happen all the time. Know what to do to keep you and your family safe when storms strike!

Indoor Safety

Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You can use a cell or cordless phone.

Do not wash your hands, bathe, shower, do laundry, or wash dishes.

Outdoor Safety

- » If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- » Do not go under trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- » Wait at least 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- » Stay away from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- » There is no safe place outside. Places with only a roof on sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used.
- » If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away.

FAST FACTS

Lightning may strike as far as 10 miles from any rain.
